The Genesis of Re-Entry Courts – Illinois Room (2nd Floor)

The idea of a “re-entry” court took shape during 2000 when Indiana Allen County Superior Court Judge John Surbeck, Sheila Hudson, Executive Director of the Allen County Community Corrections, Terry Donahue, a Fort Wayne native working for the U.S. Department of Justice and Graham Richard, Mayor of Fort Wayne, examined recidivism rates and concluded that a significant majority of the crimes committed in the community were committed by the same offenders. **Judge Surbeck** and **Sheila Hudson** will offer insights on how an effective court program can change the lives of recently released offenders as they transition to productive citizens.

- **Pound 1906 - The Most Important Speech in Judicial History**

One hundred years ago, Dean Roscoe Pound, a prolific legal scholar and dean of Harvard Law School, scrutinized the causes of dissatisfaction with the administration of justice in America. The intervening years have brought many changes in jurisprudence and court administration. Yet, causes of dissatisfaction still linger. Some are the same as those identified by Pound; others are new and different. On this one hundredth anniversary of Dean Pound's critical writing, it is fitting that State Chiefs and Court Administrators, as leaders of the American judiciary, again turn a critical eye on the administration of justice. **Professor Friedman**, will introduce us to Pound's writing, place it in context, and give us a historical perspective on the administration of justice.

- **Session 1: "Popular Impatience with Restraint" - Do Americans Really Want an Independent Judiciary?**

Dean Pound posited that one source of dissatisfaction was that the public never fully reconciled itself to the restraint the law necessarily imposes. By its very nature, law restrains people from doing what they may wish to do. People so restrained naturally tend to feel a bit put off by the judges who enforce the law. Today, the "restrained" people who are unhappy with a ruling have no hesitancy at lashing out at the judge in histrionic and sometimes violent terms. While criticism is a necessary part of the system, the tone and scale of these attacks mean judges are sometimes forced to look over their shoulder and risk a vicious backlash whipped up by commentators more concerned with ratings than reason.

- **Session 2: "The Assumption That Justice Is an Easy Task - The Effect of Pop Culture on Public Perception of the Judicial System"**

Pound declared that one cause of dissatisfaction was the assumption that justice is an easy task—anyone can run a court system or adjudicate a controversy. Does this assumption continue today? How does the manner in which judges are portrayed in American popular culture contribute to that assumption and influence popular understandings of law and legal institutions? **Professor Papke** will explore these questions in an intellectual and entertaining way, and ask the audience to consider: Is pop cultural imagery more important than actual judicial performance in creating lay expectations?

Professional court administration was unknown in 1906. If such a profession and position existed at that time, what would Pound's opinion have been? The traditional role of the judge as referee has expanded into many different things, as the judge has become an employer of many, a contractor, a property manager, an educator, a drug rehabilitator, and more. The speakers will address the effect the field of court administration has had on the judge's new roles and how these new roles affect the causes of public dissatisfaction.

"Political Jealousy - Doctrine of Judicial Supremacy"

Now that we've had a Rights Revolution, are courts too strong or not muscular enough? Pound opined that litigation tying the government's hand by court order was the "spectacle of law paralyzing administration which our policy so frequently presents." Do Americans still have a common understanding of the role judges play in governing?

"Doctrine of Contentious Proceedings"

Roscoe Pound identified one of the causes of dissatisfaction to be the common law doctrine of contentious procedure, which turns litigation into a game. He found that "the sporting theory of justice" where the judge is a mere umpire, to pass upon objections and hold counsel to the rules of the game disfigures our judicial administration. Putting aside the search for truth and justice, it promotes "getting into the record" rather than disposing of the controversy finally and upon its merits. The speakers in this session will reflect on the development of ADR and problem solving courts and whether they have affected "the sporting theory of justice."
